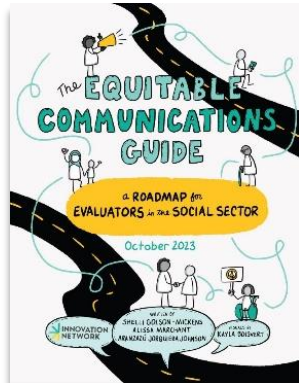


Don't let **equity** end with your **evaluation reports**.

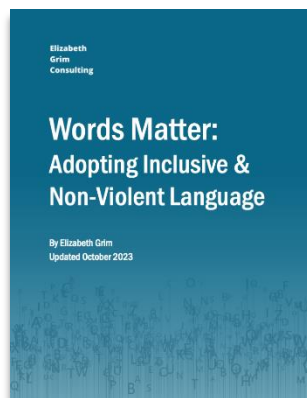
